For Curbside Pick-up

Place your commingled containers and mixed paper in the same bin

Commingled Containers

For Curbside Pick-up

YES Steel (tin) cans (do not crush or flatten)

YES Aluminum cans (do not crush or flatten), pie pans. & balled foil (2" or larger, cleaned)

YES Metal jar lids & metal bottle caps (loose)

YES Glass bottles & jars of all colors

YES Paper milk cartons & drink boxes (rinsed, do NOT flatten, no foil pouches)

YES Plastic #1-#7 bottles or jugs

(no #7 PLA compostables, no lids or caps, do not flatten)

YES Plastic #1-#7 tub or screw-top jar (no #7 PLA compostables, no lids or caps)

Please empty and rinse out all containers.

· Affixed labels are OK.

· Don't crush aluminum cans.

· Ball up aluminum foil to 2 inches or more in diameter.

NO Plastic bags of any kind

NO Plastic lids or caps

NO #7 PLA compostables

NO Nonrecycable plastics or Styrofoam

NO Plastic six-pack holders

NO Plastic microwave trays

containers, #7 PLA cups, containers & utensils made from corn starch)

YES Plant-based food waste (vegetables, fruit) Contact your trash/recycling hauler for instructions and specifics.

BOULDER COUNTY RECYCLING CENTER

This drop-off center accepts many of the materials collected at curbside, as well as additional materials. Please see the list below for ALL accepted materials. Clean containers before recycling. Materials are NOT accepted single-stream at the drop-off center and should be separated into the following categories.

- · Plastic screw-top jars: #1 only (no lids)
- Plastic tubs & cups: #2 & #5 only (no lids)

 Includes metal appliances NOT containing Freon or CFCs; these may only be dropped off Monday-Friday, 7:30 am-3:00 pm.

The Boulder County Recycling Center's drop-off facility is located just north of Arapahoe at 1901 63rd St. It is open 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. HARD-TO-RECYCLE ITEMS

Eco-Cycle/City of Boulder Center for Hard-to-Recycle Materials (CHaRM) accepts computer equipment, TVs, VCRs, DVDs, audio equipment, fax machines, cell phones, copiers, inkjet and laser jet cartridges, books, computer/office manuals, plastic grocery and newspaper bags (#2, #4, clean, dry, and empty), #6 white block foam, #2 durable plastic (large toys, buckets, etc.), bike tires and tubes, fire extinguishers, small electronics, textiles, used cooking oil, porcelain sinks and toilets, and worn-out athletic shoes. materials are accepted for a fee and there is a facility fee.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Don't throw your toxic materials in the trash! Due to hazardous ingredients, many products used in the home, garden, and garage require special disposal. In 1976, CU-Boulder students created one of the nation's most successful university recycling programs. CU now recycles more than 1,400 tons of materials each year. Even Buffs games have gone green: 2008 marked the first-ever zero-waste program at an NCAA Bowl Championship Series stadium with the kick-off of Ralphie's Green Stampede, a recycling and composting program to cut sporting events' environmental footprint. Every person's effort to recycle adds up and makes a difference economically and environmentally. Operating as a partnership between University of Colorado Student Union (UCSU), Facilities Management, and the Department of Housing and Dining Services, CU Recycling diverts 30 percent of campus waste -5 tons daily - out of the landfill, saves the campus more than \$235,000 annually, and reduces our environmental impact. Recycling is convenient in and around every campus building. Look for bins marked for:

- · office pak
- newspapers
- · magazines, catalogs, & phone books
- · corrugated cardboard
- single stream (one bin for both mixed paper and commingled materials)

Use city mixed paper and commingled container guidelines.

OPEN SPACE GUIDE



OPEN SPACE & MOUNTAIN PARKS REGULATIONS 303-441-3440 www.ci.boulder.co.us/openspace

Boulder is known for its natural beauty and outdoor recreation.

More than 43,000 acres of land have been preserved and protected.

Wildlife habitat, unique geologic features, greenways, and 130 miles

of trails are all part of Boulder's Open Space & Mountain Parks (OSMP). These lands provide scenic enjoyment and passive recreation for area residents and visitors. Please help protect them by enjoying them appropriately.

ALCOHOL

State law prohibits the consumption of alcohol greater than 3.2% in any public place. Glass containers are prohibited on OSMP lands.

BIKE REGULATIONS

Biking is allowed only on designated trails, which are identified on the OSMP Trail Map.

Why: Bikes must remain on-trail to limit erosion and costly trail maintenance, and reduce conflicts between users.

When people or animals walk, they leave disjointed tracks, whereas a bike leaves a continuous rut that water will follow when draining. Also, some visitors prefer not to be startled by a biker.

CAMPING & CAMPFIRES

Camping and use of a vehicle as a residence are prohibited.

No tents or nets may be erected. There is ONE exception: a small campground at Fourth of July Trailhead, located in the mountains about one hour west of Boulder.

Fires are permitted only at the Flagstaff Mountain area, and only in the designated fire pits or grills. Fires are prohibited between 11:00 pm and 6:00 am, and must be extinguished completely prior to leaving the area. Fire bans may be in effect.

Why: Both require increased maintenance and patrol. Camping can negatively impact vegetation, wildlife, and other park visitors, and human waste may jeopardize the environment. Campfires increase the danger of wildfire.

CLIMBING & BOLTING

Adding new fixed hardware (bolts, pitons, pins) is prohibited. If you find a bolt that needs replacing, note it on the Notification for Bolt Replacement Form and submit to OSMP staff.

Why: Because Mountain Parks is such a popular destination for climbers, there is an abundance of scarring, social trails, and other natural resource damage from new route development and placing fixed protection.

DOGS

Dog regulations vary on OSMP lands. In some areas dogs must be leashed. In other areas, dogs may be allowed off leash if they meet OSMP's voice and sight control standards at all times. Dogs are prohibited on a few trails. Consult OSMP for details on trails and requirements for dogs. Visitors are legally responsible for picking up and disposing of their pet's excrement.

Why: Dogs must be managed when visiting in order to limit negative impacts on the environment and other visitors. Dogs can frighten or chase wildlife, and some visitors are afraid of dogs.

Managing dogs also helps protect dogs and their guardians. For example, dogs sniffing in prairie dog holes can pick up fleas carrying



bubonic plague. Dogs can be stung by insects, sprayed by skunks, eaten by mountain lions, infected with rabies or distemper, injured, or lost. Dog waste is a health hazard and damages the environment. OSMP relies on visitors to pick up after their dogs. Each year OSMP staff remove about 40 tons of dog waste from trailhead trashcans. That's the equivalent weight of 15 Ford Explorers!

"LEAVE NO TRACE" PRINCIPLES

Protecting and preserving OSMP is the responsibility of those who visit it, love it, and help pay for it through their taxes. While visiting OSMP lands, please observe these six Leave No Trace principles, which will lighten your impact on the land and help keep it pristine for future generations.

- Manage your dog.
- Pick up poop.
- Trash your trash only in garbage cans.
- · Leave it as you find it.
- · Stick to the trails.
- Share our trails.

Want to help protect these lands? Become an OSMP Education Volunteer and spread the Leave No Trace message.

MORE DETAILS

The regulations noted on this page are in effect on the City of Boulder OSMP for the enjoyment and protection of this unique resource. Visitors are responsible for knowing and obeying all OSMP regulations, so read posted regulations at each trailhead, as they vary by area. Violations may result in summons and/or fines.
